

### Instructions

1. Print out the template below then colour in the rubbish items using your favourite crayons, pencils or markers.
2. Cut each of the cards out then shuffle the pile to mix the deck thoroughly. You may wish to glue your coloured template onto a sheet of thick card beforehand for added strength.
3. Spread the deck face down across your table or floor ready for the first player to begin.
4. Taking it in turns, each player reveals two cards; one at a time. If a player first reveals an item of rubbish, they must then turn over a corresponding recycle bin. If they select

a recycle bin first, then the next reveal must be a matching item of rubbish. (E.g. Player 1 reveals an apple core with their first card and a green recycle bin with their second. They have created a match! Player 2 reveals a red recycle bin with their first card and a glass bottle with their second. Unfortunately, they have not created a match.)

5. If a player matches correctly, they get another turn. If they don't, play passes to their opponent. The game continues until all the cards have been matched, at which point the player with the most pairs wins the game.

### A note on bin colours

In order to standardize the experience for all players, this game adopts the four colour-coded bin system (i.e. yellow for plastic/paper, green for garden/food; purple for glass; and red for all other waste) that is due to be rolled out across Victoria soon. If you'd like use your council's current color system or something more familiar, simply print out and colour in the uncoloured template instead.

### Game variant

For a simpler game, print the rubbish template out twice and try to match these rather than the corresponding recycle bin. All other rules remain as normal.



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











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
