

# **LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition**

Social Story



I am going to LEGO®  
Star Wars: The Exhibition  
at Melbourne Museum.

I will need to have a ticket  
to enter LEGO® Star Wars:  
The Exhibition.

We can buy tickets before  
we arrive at the Museum  
from the Melbourne  
Museum website.

We can save the ticket on a  
mobile phone or print it  
out on a piece of paper and  
bring with me on the day.







If we don't have tickets before we arrive, that's OK. I can buy a ticket at the Melbourne Museum.

We can line up and wait our turn to buy tickets from the Museum Staff at the counters.





LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition has a sensory warning to let visitors know that some spaces have lighting effects, low lighting and loud noises.

I can borrow a sensory bag from the ticket desk before I go into LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition, if I think I might need one or forgot to bring my usual aids.





LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition is downstairs. I can use the escalators or the elevator to get there. This is called the lower ground floor.





I may want to use the toilet before I go into LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition. There are bathrooms on the Lower Ground Floor with private toilets, wash basins, soap and hand dryers.



If I need to use the toilet once we're inside the exhibition, that is OK. I can leave the exhibition at any time. To go, I will walk through the Gift Shop. I will let the staff member at the counter know I'm coming back. When I'm ready to come back into the exhibition, I can re-enter through the Gift Shop.







There may be a lot of people visiting LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition today, too.

I will line up at the entrance to LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition with other people and wait for my turn to enter the exhibition.





We will show our tickets to the Museum Staff at the entrance.

The Museum Staff will scan my ticket with a handheld device. This helps them keep track of how many people are visiting the Exhibition.

Museum Staff will be wearing a museum uniform and a colourful lanyard. They are friendly people who can answer any questions I might have about the exhibition or the Museum.







There is a door leading into the exhibition that looks like a door from a starship in the *Star Wars* movies.

The door will slide open so I can enter the first room of LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition.

There might be a lot of people who enter this first room with me. It could be crowded. That's OK. There is enough room for everyone!





In the first room of the exhibition, I will watch a video of Ryan 'Brickman' McNaught. I might know Brickman from the TV Show LEGO® Masters Australia. Brickman and his team made the LEGO® Models in this exhibition. In the video, Brickman will share some LEGO® *Star Wars* facts and figures!

On the screens, I will see some images from the *Star Wars* movies and TV shows. I will hear the theme music from *Star Wars*. It might be loud. I can wear ear defenders if I want to.





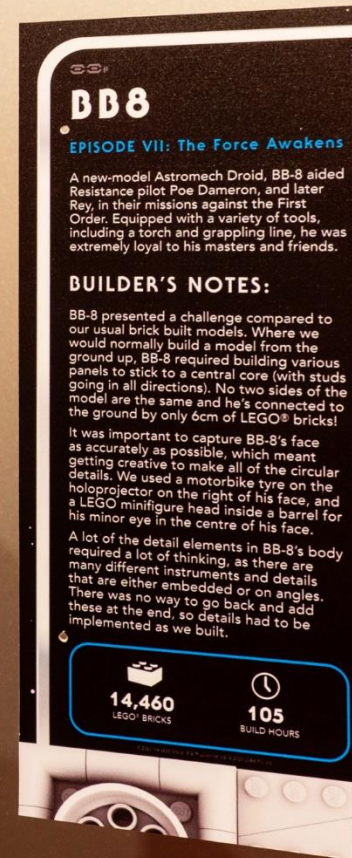


When the video is over, I will leave the first room and start exploring LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition.

In the next room, I will see LEGO models from the Droid Hall of Fame.

Droids are the robotic characters from *Star Wars*. Some of the Droids will be big, and some will be small. The Droids in the exhibition have all been made from LEGO bricks!





I can find information about how many LEGO® bricks Brickman and his team used and how many hours it took to build each model in the exhibition.





I will see a lot of LEGO® *Star Wars* models in the exhibition.

I will see LEGO models of starships. They will look smaller than they did in the *Star Wars* movies.





I will see LEGO® models of some of the characters from the *Star Wars* movies and TV shows. Some of the LEGO models will be tall, like Chewbacca. Some will be small, like Grogu. Some will look like they are fighting with lightsabers. They are all made out of LEGO bricks and pieces.







There are some LEGO® build tables in the exhibition. This is where I can make my own LEGO *Star Wars* models if I want to. The model I make will stay in the exhibition – I won't take it home with me.





When I finish building my LEGO® model, I will put it on display on the shelf with the other LEGO models people have built.

I can see what other people have made.

I understand that I can't take the LEGO model I built with me – it needs to stay in LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition.

3. Add weapons and engines to help outmaneuver the enemy.
4. Bring your Rebel fighter to our scan box to watch it fight against the Empire!



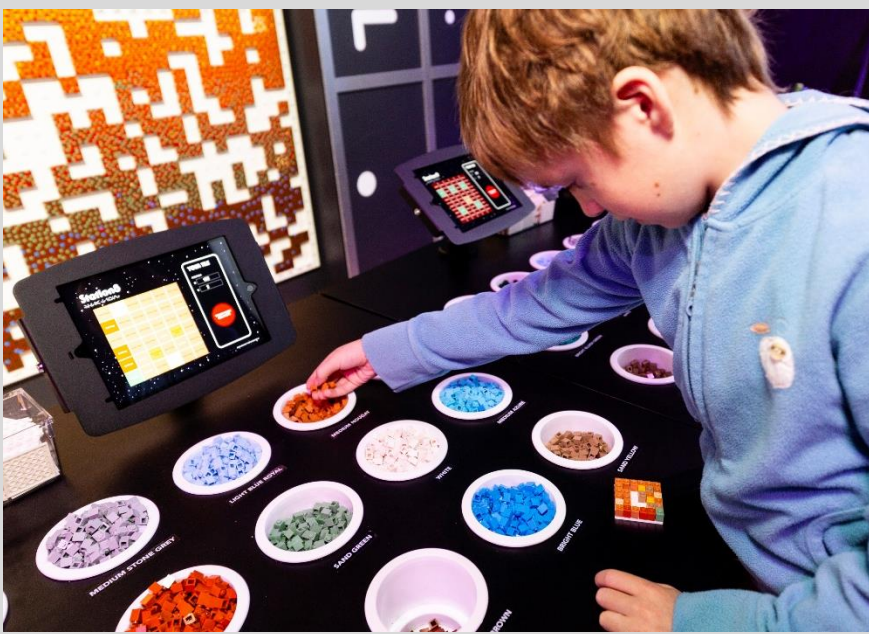
There are containers of LEGO® bricks at the build tables. I can choose some LEGO bricks and use them to build a *Star Wars* model.

There are instructions on the table to help me build my model. I can follow the instructions or make the model however I want to! I can use my imagination and be creative.

There might be other people also making LEGO models at the build tables. That's OK. There are enough LEGO pieces for everyone. I will wait for my turn.

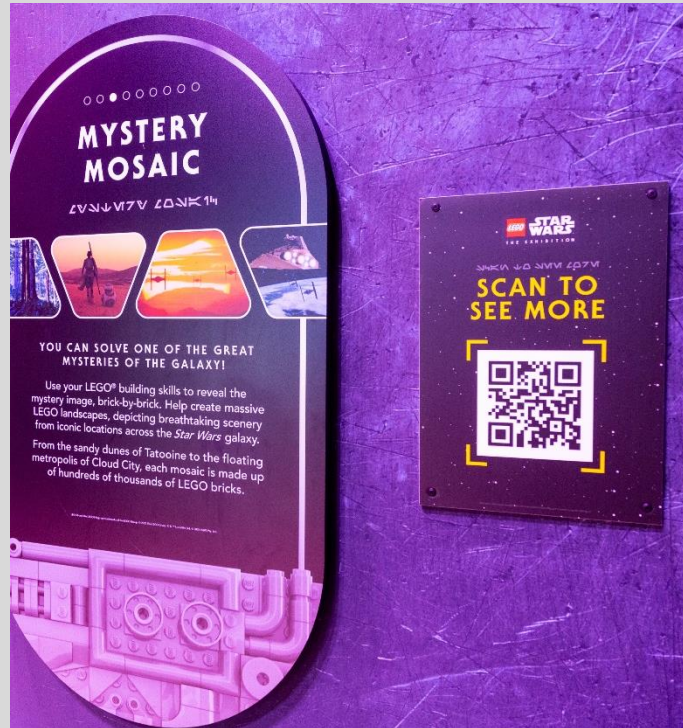
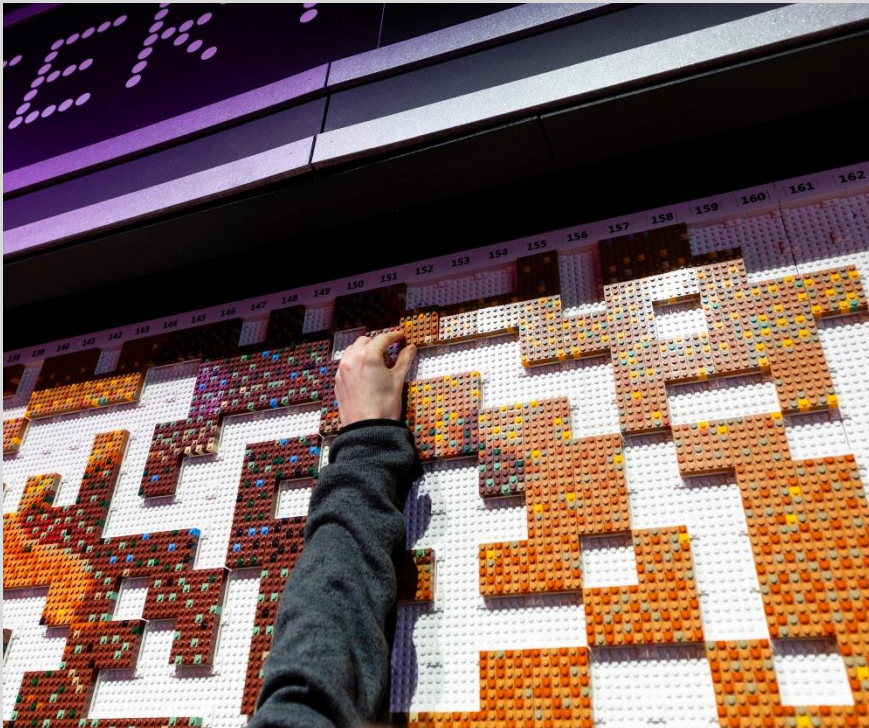






Everyone who visits the exhibition can add LEGO® bricks to help make a *Star Wars* mosaic picture. It can be fun to work together as a team to make something.

The mosaic uses lots of colourful LEGO bricks and takes a long time to finish, so I might not see it completed today.



There's a QR code I can scan with a mobile phone to see the mosaic's progress online. I can check this website when I get home.





There are some things in the exhibition I can touch, and some things I can play with. I can have a pretend lightsaber battle or sit on the Emperor's throne if I want to.





There are some things in the exhibition I'm not allowed to touch them because they are very fragile.

If I'm unsure whether I can touch something or not, I will ask the Museum Staff.





I can take photos and videos of the LEGO® *Star Wars* models if I want to. I might pose next to my favourite characters and take photos.

I will stand on the floor next to LEGO *Star Wars* models. I won't stand on the platforms – these platforms are to display the LEGO *Star Wars* models and are not built for humans!





There may be some parts of the exhibition which are bright. I can wear sunglasses if it feels too bright.

There might be some loud music or sounds in the exhibition. There might be a lot of people talking loudly, too.

I can wear ear defenders if it gets too loud.





There could be a lot of people visiting LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition, and sometimes it might get crowded.

I can take a break on the couch if I need to.







When I'm ready to leave LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition, I will use the exit.

The exit is through the exhibition gift shop. This is a small shop where people can buy things.

Not everyone will be able to buy something, and that's OK! I can walk through the shop and not buy anything.





After I leave LEGO® Star Wars: The Exhibition, I can exit from the Melbourne Museum.

The exit is through the museum foyer on the ground floor – that is where I started my visit today!

To get to the ground floor, I will go up one level. I can use the escalator or elevator.

On the way home, we might like to talk about the most interesting parts of the exhibition and our favourite LEGO *Star Wars* models!
