What is a Visual Story?

Visual stories are written in an easy read format and use pictures to provide greater accessibility for everyone.

This Visual Story has been developed in collaboration with Autism Spectrum Australia.

Visual stories are used to prepare people for a new environment or situation. Visual stories help me to become more familiar with a situation or event, and know what to expect before I attend.

Being prepared and knowing what to expect can help to reduce my anxiety and stress.

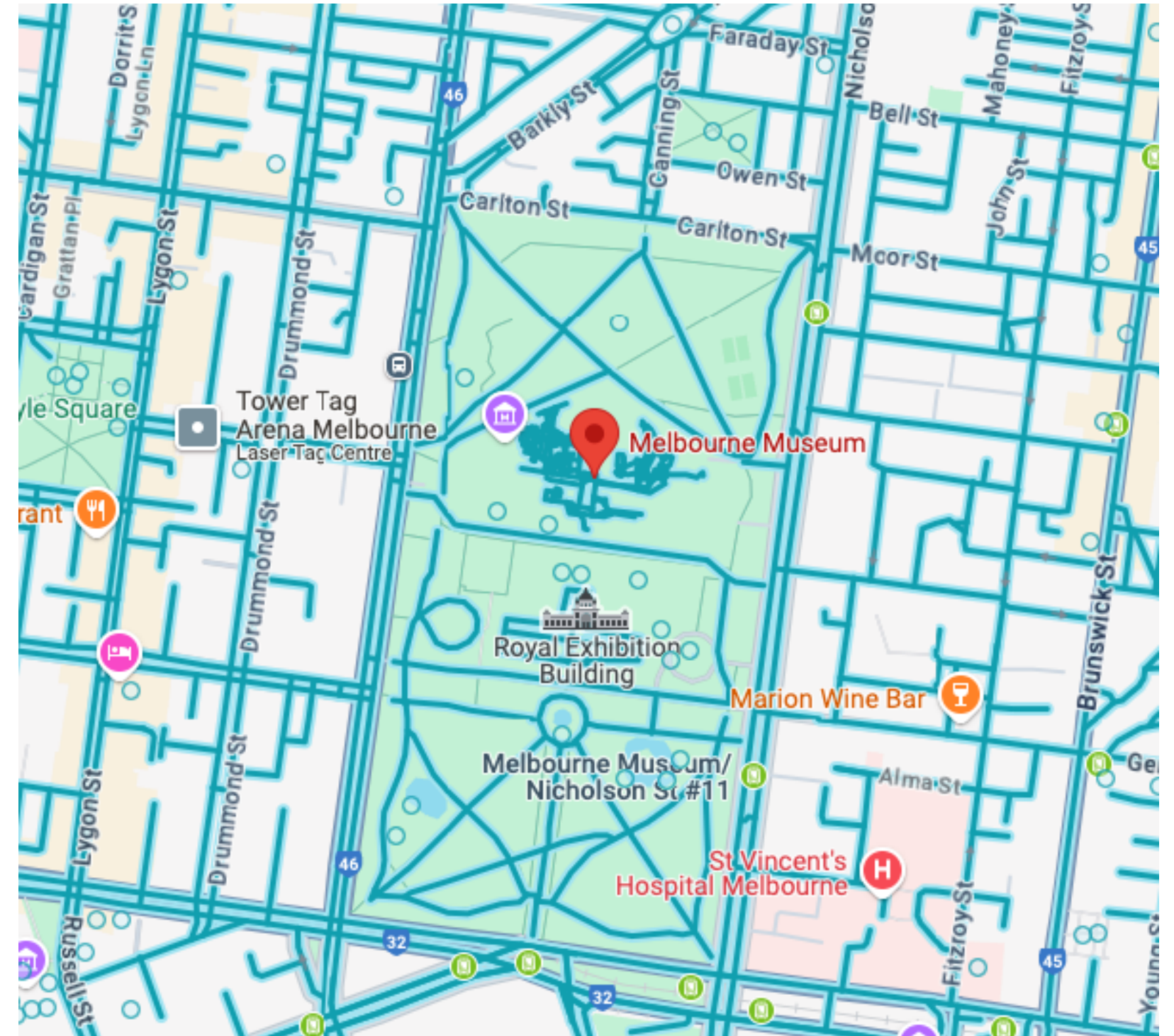

Where is Melbourne Museum

When I visit the museum I may get there by car, bus, tram or train.

I will look for the big building with a front of glass which is Melbourne Museum, with another large older brick building called the Royal Exhibition Building opposite it.

If I come by car, we might park in one of the parking spots around Carlton Gardens or go into the museum car park from Nicholson or Rathdowne Streets.

We will drive our car down a ramp, take a ticket from a machine, the barrier will lift and then we will drive into the museum car park. The car park is a large concrete area on two levels, and the lights will come on as we drive in.

Once our car is parked, we will walk through the car park and can use a lift, stairs or a ramp to get to the entrance of the museum.

Getting There

Public Transport options include:

- Tram route 86 or tram route 96 to Stop 11 Melbourne Museum, corner of Nicholson and Gertrude Streets (
- Free City Circle Tram to Victoria Parade
- City loop train to Parliament Station
- Bus routes 250, 251 and 402 to Rathdowne Street
- Making a trip to the city? Take a V/Line train

Getting here by bicycle

Local bicycle facilities include bike lanes on Rathdowne St and Canning St. There is also a shared pedestrian/bike path on Nicholson St.

Bicycle racks on the Plaza provide ample bike parking just outside the front door.

Parking

Located under Melbourne Museum, the car park is open 5:30am to midnight daily. Enter via Rathdowne Street or Nicholson Street.

Terms and conditions apply. All rates include GST. Lost tickets incur maximum day rate. This car park is under 24-hour video surveillance.

Entrance to Carpark



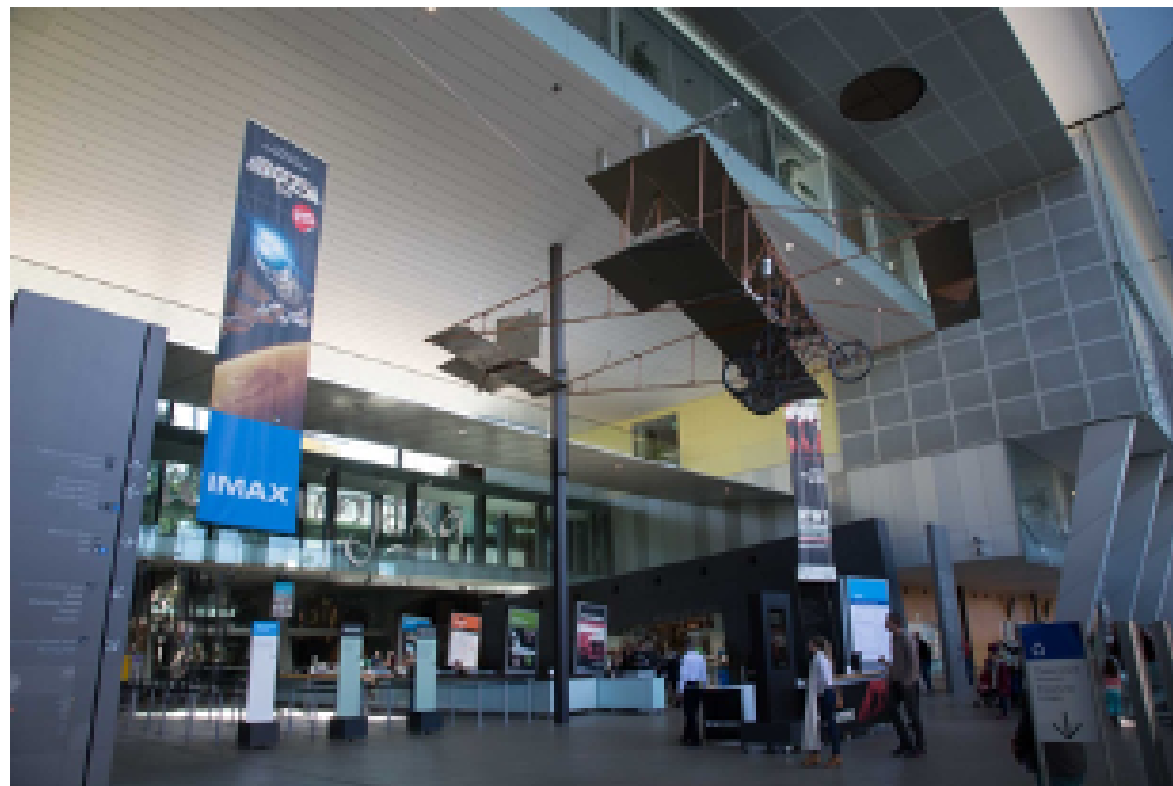
When I arrive

I know I have arrived at the entrance to the museum when I see the big glass sliding doors. I will see a sunflower sign on the front doors.

I will walk into the foyer of the museum through the sliding glass doors and I will be in a big space with a very high ceiling.

The ticket desk will be in front of me. If I have already booked my tickets friendly staff will scan my ticket at the entry. If I have not booked tickets, I can book tickets using the QR code at the door. If I am on the door list, the staff at the desk will ask my name and check the list, then let me through.

If I have a bag I don't want to carry around, I can leave it in a self-cloaking locker. The lockers are located around the corner to the left near the whale skeleton.



Accessibility Information

Accessible entrance

The main entrance is accessible. It is in the central courtyard between the Royal Exhibition Building and the Melbourne Museum.

Getting to the entrance:

- The doorway is a flat, paved surface with no step.
- The car park has a lift to the ground floor.
- The kerbside on Nicholson and Rathdowne Street is a gentle sloping kerb.

Wheelchairs

Wheelchairs (standard and wide) are available free of charge from the foyer at Melbourne Museum. We recommend booking a wheelchair by calling Melbourne Museum on 13 11 02 before your visit.

All exhibition galleries and public spaces have lift and/or ramp access.

Wheelchair/mobility scooter seating spaces are available at IMAX Melbourne.

You can purchase these spaces online at imaxmelbourne.com.au by buying your ticket and choosing the wheelchair/mobility spaces on the IMAX seat map or by calling the IMAX Box office at (03) 9663 5454.

A wheelchair access map can be provided upon request from the front desk.

Accessibility Information

Toilets

Accessible toilets are located across the three levels of Melbourne Museum:

Ground Level

- School's Entrance (Accessible / Baby Change Facilities / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 750mm and a left-hand transfer.
- Between the Museum Shop and Cafe (Accessible / Baby change table / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 800mm with a left-hand transfer.
- Foyer in front of Bunjilaka Aboriginal Cultural Centre (Accessible / Baby change table / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 750mm and a left-hand transfer.
- Museum Theatre (Accessible / Baby change table / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 820mm with a right-hand transfer.

Upper Level

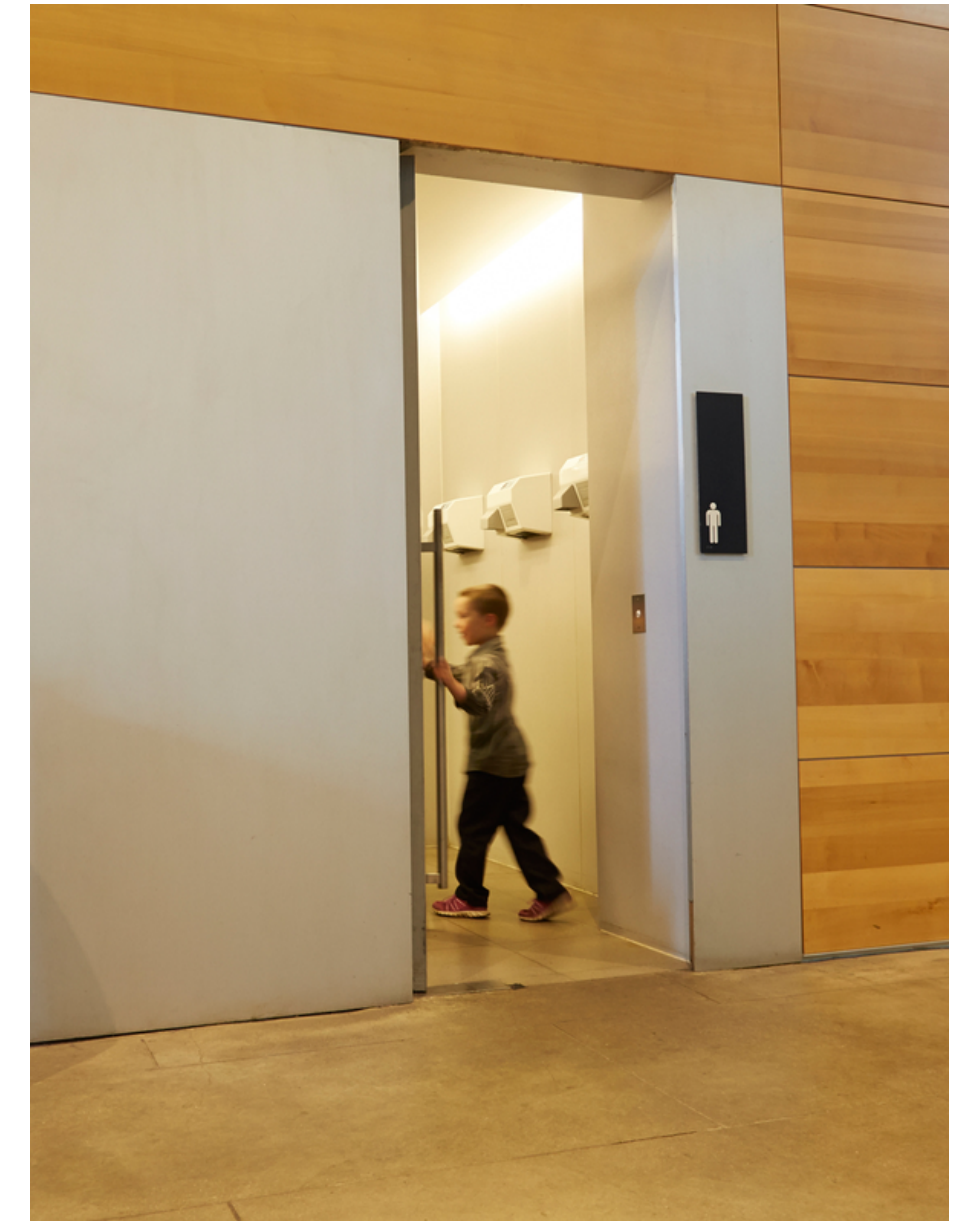
- Foyer across from Mind and Body Gallery (Accessible / Baby change table / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 840mm with a left-hand transfer.
- Foyer across from Melbourne Gallery (Accessible / Baby change table / All Persons) has a door width of approximately 840mm with a left-hand transfer.
- All toilet doors open inwards.
- Please note that the minimum toilet facility dimensions for DDA compliance are based on wheelchair dimensions, not motorised scooter dimensions. The toilet facilities at Melbourne Museum may not accommodate the width and turning range requirements of mobility scooters.
- Melbourne Museum does not have a hoist or adult changing facilities.

Sensory Bags

If you have sensory sensitivities or are feeling overwhelmed during your visit, you can borrow a free sensory bag.

The bags contain:

Noise reduction earmuffs, Fidget tools, A communication card. Sensory bags can be borrowed from the admissions desk located in the entrance foyer and returned to the same location at the end of your visit



Accessibility Information

Hidden Disabilities Sunflower program

Museums Victoria is a proud Hidden Disabilities Sunflower program partner to support and raise awareness of those living with a hidden disability. The training of Museums Victoria staff, both public facing and back of house, ensures that our staff are able to offer respectful and discreet help to those who need it. By wearing the Hidden Disabilities Sunflower lanyard or wristband, visitors can communicate their requirement for support in a way that is recognised and respected by staff.



What to expect

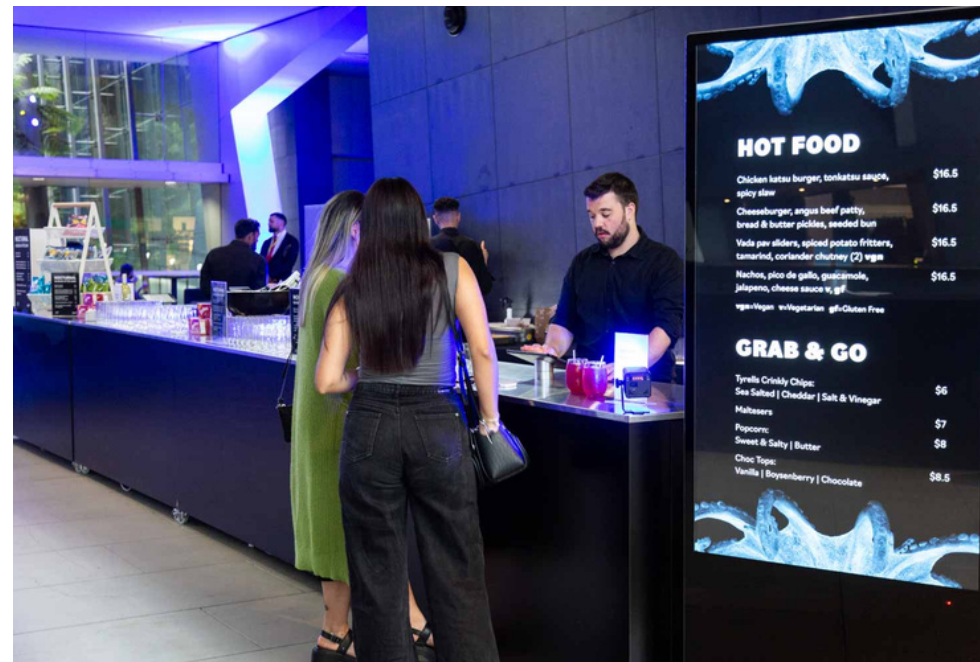
- I will check in with a QR Code on arrival or mention my name to staff if I am on a door list.

- I can buy drinks including alcohol and snacks at the bar.
- I can stay as long or as little as I like.



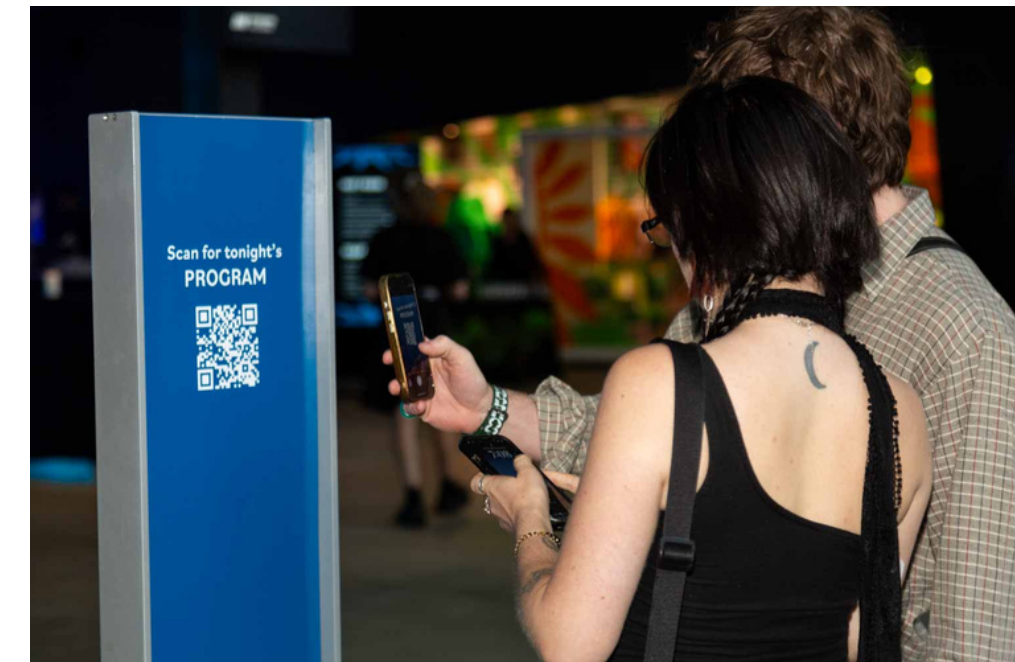
Ticket Scanner with QR Code

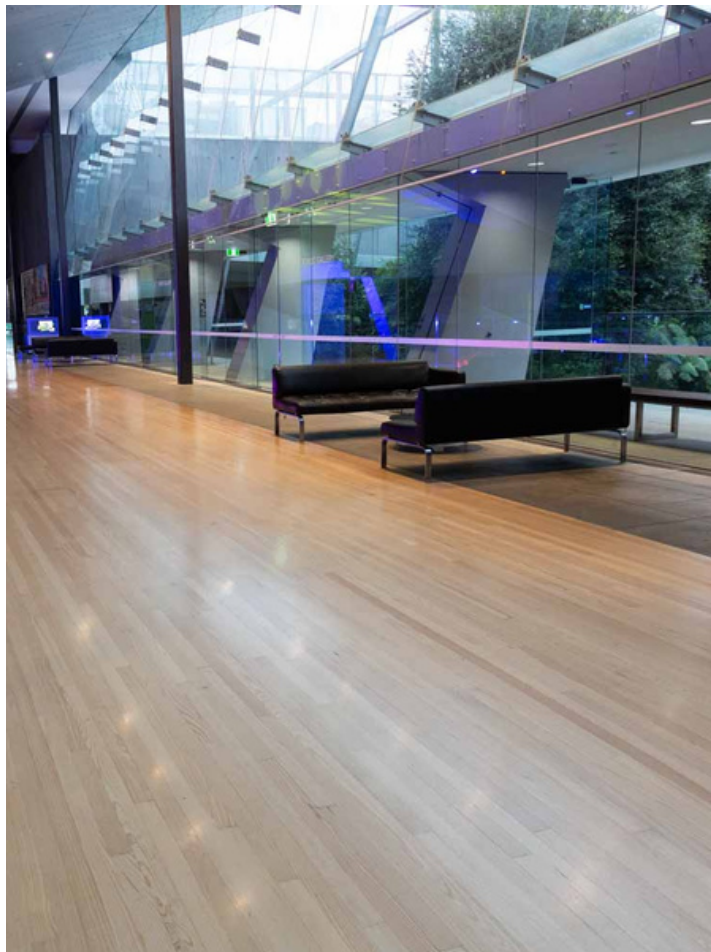

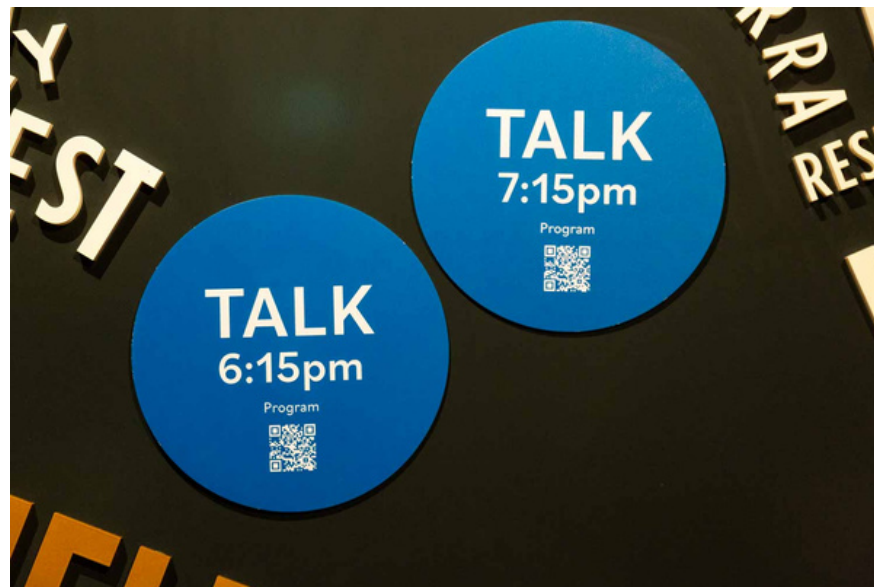
- I can join in with activities if I like or I can choose not to.

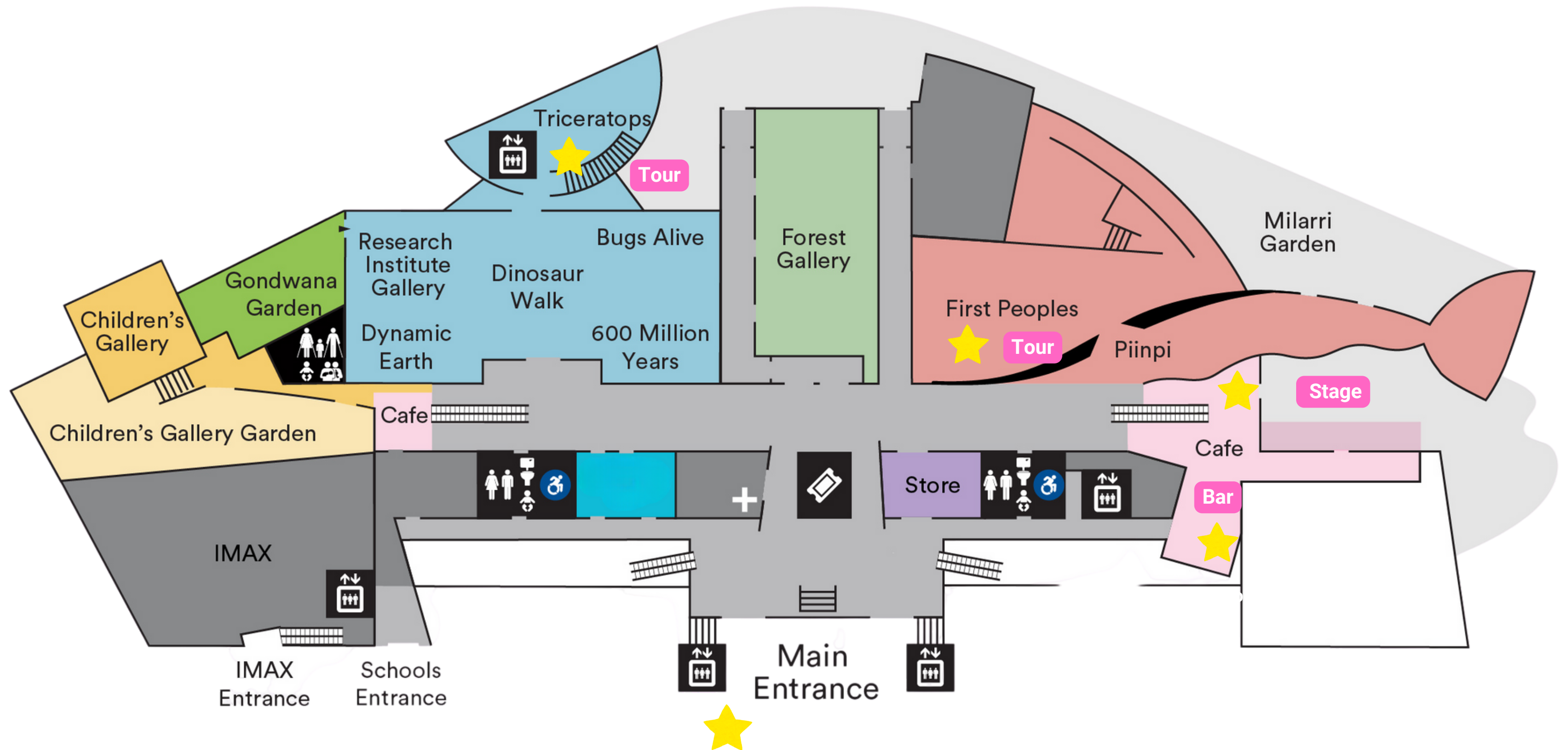

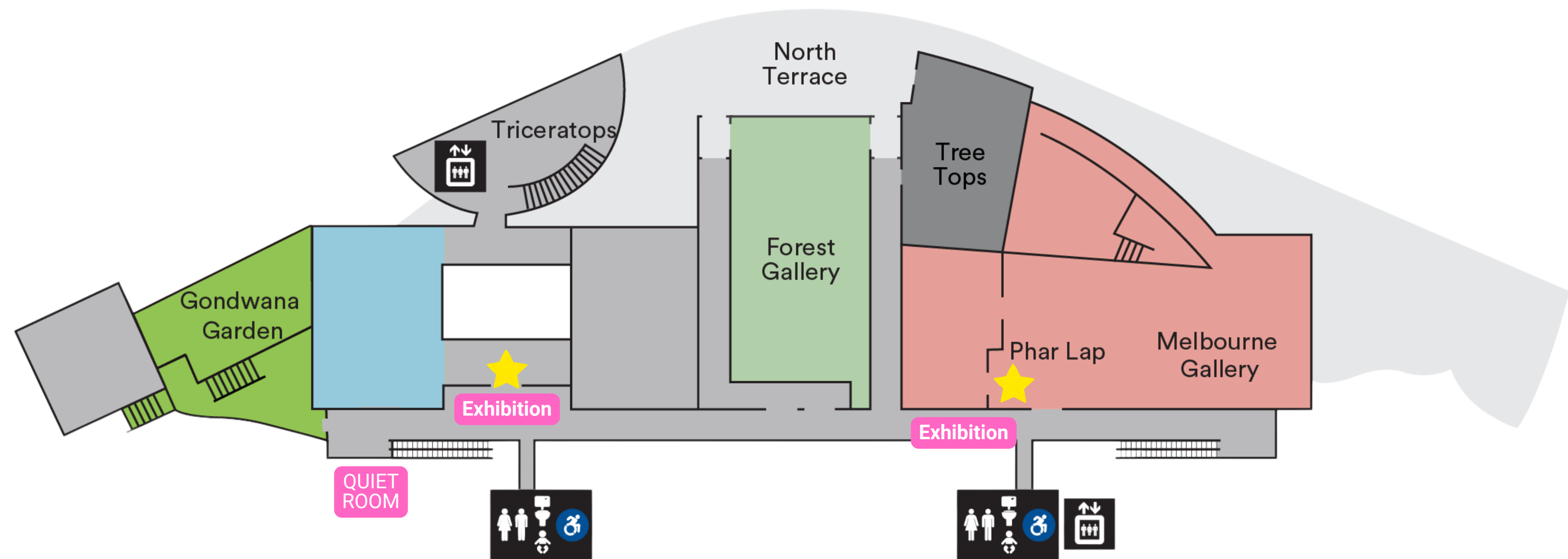
Map of Event Activities
