Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard

I am going to the Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard exhibition at Melbourne Museum.

The *Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard* is an exhibition from the National Museums of Scotland.





A **hoard** is a collection of valuable objects that have been buried in the ground.

The Galloway Hoard was discovered in 2014 and is believed to have been buried around the year 900. These treasures were hidden, and buried, for over a thousand years!

I am going to see the Galloway Hoard in the exhibition.





I will need to buy a ticket for this exhibition.

I can buy a ticket from the Melbourne Museum website online, or at the Melbourne Museum on the day of my visit.

I might need to line up to buy a ticket from the Melbourne Museum ticket desk.





The Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard exhibition is located on the first floor of the Melbourne Museum.

To get up to the first floor, I can take the escalators, use an elevator, or follow the ramp next to the Forest Gallery.





I will show my ticket to the Museum Staff at the entrance to the *Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard* exhibition before I enter.





The lighting in the exhibition will be quite low and it will be a little dark inside.

This helps protect the objects from the Galloway Hoard which are very special and fragile.





I will see written text, maps and photographs on the walls of the exhibition.

I can read this information to learn more about the Galloway Hoard objects and the Viking Age.

A fresh influx of silver

In the 9th century CE, Scandinavian connections across the North Sea brought warfare, trade and settlement to Britan and Ireland. Scandinavian dynasties and their war-bands began to control territories from centres in Dublin and York, disrupting existing kingdoms and politics.

A fresh influx of silver is one of the best archaeological indicators of these new influences. Silver arm-rings, like those in the Galloway Hoard, are mostly found in Ireland and in heards of silver bullion discovered around the Irish See, in north Wales and northern England.

Gallowey was in an ambiguous position, located at the western limit of the Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Northumbris, but also connected to this Irish Sea zone. The Gallowey Hoard is Scotland's earliest Viking-age hoard, buried near the village of Balmaghie sometime before 900 CE.

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There are interesting and informative videos I can watch to understand more about the Galloway Hoard and the Viking Age.





I will see small and unique objects made from silver and gold and other materials.

Most of the objects here are the real objects that were found in the Galloway Hoard.

The objects are kept behind glass to keep them safe.





Two objects in the exhibition are replicas.

The crystal rock jar and the lidded vessel are exact copies of the real objects that were found.

The real objects were too fragile to bring to Melbourne; they are kept in Scotland and England.





There are some touchscreens in the exhibition. I can use these to see details of some of the objects more closely.





I can leave the exhibition whenever I want to.

If I need to take a short break or go to the bathroom, I can leave the exhibition and return when I feel ready. I will need to show my ticket to the Museum Staff member outside the exhibition again before I re-enter.





There is a lot to read, see, watch and learn in *Treasures of the Viking Age: The Galloway Hoard* exhibition.

I can visit exhibitions and galleries if I want to and have enough time before leaving the Melbourne Museum.
